Adventure in Thailand the trip of a lifetime for Maplewood teen

Name: Daniel Ives

Achievement: From March 26 to April 5, Daniel embarked on a journey that he won't soon forget. He was chosen to participate in the Nick News Adventures show on Nickelodeon hosted by Linda Ellerbee. He along with five other contestants traveled to Thailand to visit Royal Thai Elephant Reserve. While in Thailand, Daniel adopted an elephant and learned how to train it. He also ate food that is different from what he is accustomed to eating in the United States. Daniel ate mealworms, which he insists tastes like French fries. He also ate ant eggs, which are a good source of protein. Bee larva was also on the menu.

He "absorbed the culture of Thailand while the camera wasn't rolling and was very observant." Daniel was amazed by how enormous the elephants were and believes that an elephant wouldn't harm anyone, unless it was put in harms way. He admits that he had culture shock for a few days.

"Not every culture is the same and no matter where you go, you'll get to meet new friends and learn a little about their culture," he said. The program was televised on July 22.

The selection process: Christopher M. Harrison, principal of Maplewood Middle School, nominated him for the program. Daniel was given a phone interview and asked to submit an essay along with photographs. From there, he was selected from a national pool to participate in the broadcast.

Sequence of events: He met the cast of Nick News Adventure show at Los Angeles International Airport; the crew was already assembled on location. Daniel traveled on a plane, for 18 hours to Thailand. He was also given an on-air screen play. Later that day, he got to see the elephant he would be responsible for caring for. The second day, he learned what to do in order to command an elephant. On the third day, he learned how to wash

an elephant and participated in an elephant race. He visited a baby elephant that was injured on the fourth day. Day five consisted of interviews as well as tours of Thailand.


He also met the director of the sanctuary. "Established by the king himself, to protect elephants from endangerment." In addition, he went camping and was allowed to sleep outside with the elephants. On the last day, he said his final goodbyes to the elephants and departed Thailand.

Award-winning teacher strives to motivate students to innovate

Name: Kenneth Zushma

Education: Zushma attended Kean University, where he received a bachelor of science degree in industrial arts education and a master of arts degree in educational leadership.

Achievement: He recently received the Innovative Technology Educator award from the Technology Educators Association of New Jersey, which is sponsored by the Martinson Family Foundation. Zushma teaches technology education to, seventh- and eighth-graders at Heritage Middle School in Livingston.


About the award: He won the award because of a project he worked on with his seventh-grade class. Zushma instructed his students to design and build an electronic game. This trifecta of design, manufacturing and electronics grabbed the attention of the awards committee. He is grateful for receiving the technology award, which five teachers win per year. The winners are chosen by the executive board, which also includes previous winners.

The classroom and beyond: His style of teaching includes instilling confidence, organizational skills and the ability to communicate ideas. Zushma says New Jersey is known as the "innovation state" and hopes his classes do just that: motivate his students to be innovative.

Bigest challenges: He says "keeping things fresh, for the sake of the students," is his biggest task. Zushma tries to teach in a manner that is very "cross-curricular." He says by teaching this way, students can apply the knowledge they gain in his classes, to other subjects. He compares his courses of study to other teachers, to make sure his classes are "current and still deliver the same instruction." This requires him to make constant revisions to his curricular.

"As teachers, we always inspire them to do better than we do," he said.

His muse: His inspiration came



from his teachers at South Plainfield High School. The industrial arts and design program prompted him to get into technology, education and design.

A knack for teaching: He has been teaching at Heritage Middle School since 2003. Zushma started as a long-term leave replacement teacher.

After a year and a half, he transferred to the district's high school. Though he returned to junior high, Zushma has the opportunity to continue teaching high school. He believes this experience would be rewarding because he may get to "see his students grow up."

Career objectives: He wants to continue teaching and hopes to be known as a leader in education.

On his bookshelf: He enjoys reading author Tom Kelley. He

cites "The Ten Faces of Innovation" and "The Art of Innovation" as his favorites.

Zushma likes these books because they "break down the innovation process and demonstrate that best ideas don't always come from a conforming atmosphere."

A piece of mind: His happiness comes from being in the classroom, Zushma said. The highlight of teaching is when his students are in his presence. He also likes the fact that he can "make them aware that they have the ability to produce results."

In his spare time: Zushma keeps saltwater reefs and finds it relaxing. He says a person would normally have to go scuba diving or snorkeling to see them, but as an added bonus, he gets to see them in his office.



Teen's road to cycling extends to college

Education: Columbia High School

Future: He will attend the University of Colorado at Boulder in September and will be joining the university's cycling team. His major is undecided as of right now, but Jones will probably be a science major.

Accomplishment: Jones was introduced to cycling three years ago by his high school physics teacher, Mike Novemsky. He has since transitioned from mountain biking to road racing. Jones was then directed to the coaches on a junior team and started racing locally. He was recruited by Ben Sharp, who is the USA Cycling Junior endurance coach.

Jones was chosen to participate with the team following his outstanding performance at the Junior National Road Championships in July 2006. USA Cycling is the official cycling organization that is responsible for identifying and training cyclists to represent the United States in international competitions. After his acceptance, Jones attended the Jun-

ior National Team Camp at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

On the road: In May, Jones competed on the USA Cycling Junior National Team in Europe. He was the only cyclist from New Jersey on the team. While in Europe, he participated in a series of three races. The first race, Wortegem-Petegem, lasted for a day and took place in Belgium. The next race, Course de la Paix, took place in the Czech Republic and lasted for five days.

The final race, which lasted two days, was called the Ronde Van Axel and took place in the Netherlands. In the Course de la Paix race, Jones placed 26th, and in the Ronde Van Axel race he ranked 16th. Because Jones placed well in the races, he will have the chance to play for the Junior World's Long Team in Abitibi, Canada. Jones also will compete in Byrds, Idaho. If he does well in Idaho, he may be chosen for the Under 23 National Team.

Hobbies: Cycling, golf, snowboarding, soccer, football and spending time with friends.

Long-term goals: To graduate from college and have a career as a pro cyclist in Europe.

Favorite television show: SportsCenter on ESPN

He is happiest when: "I get a good race result in a big race."

A cyclist at heart: His dedication to cycling is not only prevalent in racing, but through his current job as well. He works as a salesman at High Gear Cyclery in Millburn. He is also captain of the Colavita Junior Racing Team, which has the largest junior cycling program on the East Coast. He said the Colavita program is unique because it only works with children who are new to cycling.

His inspiration: Jones credits his father for cultivating his interest in the sport.

Proudest moments in life: He was excited to have the opportunity to travel to Europe and race against national teams. Jones also was elated to receive his cycling results for his participation in these races. Graduating from high school and being accepted into college is also among his proudest moments.

looking for people who are willing to do it. I get to make new friends and help out. It's really fulfilling," she said.


At a glance
